The meeting was called to order at 1:30 p.m. and roll call was taken.

Public Health Department

1. First Reading: Nuisance Abatement: Parcel 12-204-10-08-017.00 01

Columbia/Boone County Department of Public Health Environmental Health Supervisor Chrystal Smart stated that a citizen complaint was received on January 10, 2026, for this property and she conducted an initial inspection on January 14 to confirm that the concerns were valid. Ms. Smart stated that she sent a notice of violation to the owner via certified mail with a return receipt requested on January 15. Ms. Smart stated that an email was received from the owner acknowledging the violation on February 16, 2026. Ms. Smart stated that a reinspection of the property was conducted on March 5, 2026, and it was determined that some of the violations were still active. Ms. Smart stated that she reached out to Voss Landscaping for an estimate on April 7, 2026. Ms. Smart stated that a hearing notice was sent to the owner on March 17, 2026. Ms. Smart stated that photos were provided to the Commissioners to show progress on the property.

Commissioner Thompson asked which items that were first indicated currently remain. Ms. Smart stated that most of the junk and trash has been removed, and the vehicles have license plates and aired-up tires. Ms. Smart stated that a small amount of junk and trash remains surrounding the camper, and some boards remain on the ground underneath a pickup truck.

Commissioner Kendrick asked what the estimate was from Voss Landscaping. Ms. Smart stated that the company has not yet returned her call. Ms. Smart stated that a quote will be sent to the property owner before a second hearing.

Commissioner Kendrick opened the public hearing and asked if any members of the public were present in person or via phone who wished to speak on the matter. Troy Thompson introduced himself as the caretaker of the property located at 7800 N. Sharidan Blvd. Mr. Thompson stated that he does not understand how and why the matter has proceeded to this point. Mr. Thompson

stated that he has been willing to cooperate and communicate with the Health Department, but he has not received return phone calls or emails about the situation. Mr. Thompson stated that the last time he spoke with the Health Department about the boards in his front yard, he explained that they were there to assist the mail carrier so that other drivers would not park too close to the mailbox. Mr. Thompson stated that his yard is prone to flooding, so he placed boards over the driveway to assist vehicles getting in and out without getting stuck in the mud. Mr. Thompson stated that he had explained this to Ms. Smart and did not receive any further communication, so he was unaware that the boards were still a problem.

Commissioner Thompson stated that she could see the progression of condition in the photographs from January through the present, and it appears that progress has been made to address part of the initial complaint. Mr. Thompson stated that the vehicles have been repaired and licensed. Commissioner Thompson asked if Mr. Thompson is aware of the remaining issues, including the trash and boards. Mr. Thompson stated that he is aware of the accusations, but he does not understand them. Commissioner Thompson asked if Mr. Thompson acknowledges the photographs submitted by the Health Department are of his home and the items in his yard, and Mr. Thompson confirmed it. Mr. Thompson stated that he believed the nuisance was taken care of shortly after the initial photographs were taken.

Commissioner Kendrick stated that, in his opinion, there were still some minor nuisances relative to the initial complaint. Mr. Thompson stated that he is willing to comply, but he has had difficulty determining exactly what is required to be abated. Commissioner Kendrick stated that Ms. Smart is acting at the behest of the County Commission, and all findings and actions have been under the direction of the Commission. Commissioner Kendrick asked Mr. Thompson if one week would give him enough time to clear the remaining nuisances. Commissioner Kendrick stated that a second hearing would be scheduled for the following Thursday, and a reinspection would be completed before the hearing. Mr. Thompson stated that one week would be enough time, but he needs to know what he needs to do.

Commissioner Kendrick asked Mr. Thompson to be aware of others' needs and health, especially his neighbors and those visiting the neighborhood, and encouraged Mr. Thompson to maintain his property to avoid frequent discussions with the Health Department and the County Commission. Commissioner Thompson asked Mr. Thompson to consider alternative storage and retention solutions for his possessions and consider whether he is attempting to solve the problem or hide the problem.

Commissioner Aldred asked Mr. Thompson if he is willing to work with the Health Department to solve the issue. Mr. Thompson stated that he is willing to do so in any way he can, but he is concerned that he will not be able to communicate with the Health Department, even if he tries to follow their directions.

Commissioner Kendrick asked if there were any additional members of the public present in person or via phone who would like to speak on the matter. Hearing none, Commissioner Kendrick closed the public hearing.

Commissioner Kendrick stated that Mr. Thompson has agreed to move items and trash from his yard to remove them from line of sight from the street. Commissioner Kendrick asked Ms. Smart if this would suffice to move the matter out of abatement and prevent it from moving forward to a Commission Order, and Ms. Smart confirmed it.

Commissioner Thompson asked Ms. Smart what methods of contact she uses to communicate with Mr. Thompson. Ms. Smart stated that ordinances require letters to be sent to the owner any time the status of the property changes, such as when hearings are scheduled, and these letters have been sent to Mr. Thompson. Ms. Smart stated that she attempted to reach Mr. Thompson via phone when the initial complaint was received, and the call was not answered. Ms. Smart stated that she was unable to leave a voicemail at that time. Ms. Smart stated that there has been email communication, and one email was not responded to, as it was not pertinent to the conversation. Commissioner Thompson asked Mr. Thompson to provide a phone number for Ms. Smart to be able to reach him and requested that it have a working voicemail for Ms. Smart to leave messages.

Commissioner Kendrick requested that the Clerk add the matter to the April 16, 2026, agenda for a second reading.

Road & Bridge

2. First and Second Reading: Change Order for New Vehicle Storage & Facility Improvements at Boone County Road & Bridge Facility

Road & Bridge Director Greg Edington stated that Change Order #38 is for the Vehicle Storage Facility and the generator surface that will result in a net credit of \$17,047.66.

Commissioner Aldred moved now on this day, the County Commission of the County of Boone does hereby approve the attached Change Order for New Vehicle Storage & Facility Improvements at Boone County Road & Bridge Facility. It is further ordered that Commissioner Janet Thompson is hereby authorized to sign said agreement.

Commissioner Thompson seconded the motion.
The motion passed 3-0. **Order #173-2026**

3. First Reading: Budget Amendment – Dept 2040 Dump Truck Replacement – loss

Mr. Edington stated that the Road & Bridge Department had originally budgeted to purchase two trucks, but because of the loss of an existing truck, a third truck is needed. Mr. Edington stated that there is a 10-month lead time on vehicles.

Commissioner Kendrick requested that the Clerk add the matter to a future meeting agenda for a second reading pending the 10-day waiting period.

Collector Office

4. First and Second Reading: 2020 Tax Bill Abatements

Boone County Collector Brian McCollum stated that his office has completed the annual order and abatement from the delinquent tax rolls from property tax bills that, after due diligence, the property owners could not be contacted or are deceased, the property is part of a bankruptcy or probate proceedings, or the real estate is not subject to taxation after being acquired by a tax-exempt owner after January 1. Mr. McCollum stated that the total amount being abated from the delinquent tax rolls is \$132,624.76 and, of that amount, \$110,546.01 is from personal property, \$780.96 is from bankruptcy and/or probate, and \$21,297.79 is from tax exempt acquisitions. Mr. McCollum stated that his office added back to the delinquent tax rolls a total of \$2,552.68 from 2019 and prior personal property tax bills.

Commissioner Thompson moved now on this day, the County Commission of the County of Boone, pursuant to Chapter 139 RSMo, does hereby authorize the Boone County Collector, Brian McCollum, for the 2020 tax bill year, to strike from the delinquent tax rolls, property tax balances on real estate tax, personal property tax, railroad and utility, nuisance abatements, and community improvement district assessments as follows:

These 2020 real estate taxes, personal property taxes, railroad and utility, nuisance abatements, and community improvement district assessments are stricken for one of the following reasons:

- After due diligence, the Collector cannot locate the owners.

- Bankruptcy or probate proceedings have intervened making the balances due uncollectable.
- The real estate property was sold via a Post-Third Offering Delinquent Tax Certificate Sale.
- The real estate property was not subject to taxation after being acquired by a tax-exempt owner after January 1 of the taxable year.

The above total of \$132,624.76 breaks out as follows:

- Personal property: \$110,564.01
- Bankruptcy and/or probate: \$780.96
- Tax exempt acquisitions: \$21,297.79

The following tax amounts represent 2019 and prior tax bills that were previously stricken from the delinquent tax rolls in Boone County. Facilities Maintenance

5. First Reading: Proposal for Services with PWArchitects, Inc. for the JJC non-contact room remodel project

Facilities Management Director Jody Moore stated that this proposal is for professional services of PWArchitects, which has provided design services for the Juvenile Justice Center's (JJC) non-contact room. Ms. Moore stated that the contract services will not exceed \$23,650. Ms. Moore stated that the funding will be provided through ARPA and has already been designated to the JJC. Ms. Moore stated the Boone County Auditor's Office has certified that an appropriate budget is available for the project.

Commissioner Kendrick requested that the Clerk add the matter to a future meeting agenda for a second reading.

Prosecuting Attorney

6. First and Second Reading: Approve an application for the Missouri Department of Public Safety 2027 State Services to Victims Fund (SSVF)

Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Melissa Buchanan stated that the Prosecuting Attorney's Office is seeking permission to apply for the SSVF grant. Ms. Buchanan stated that this grant is for the Victim Response Team for violent crimes and would provide funding for a specific person within that unit to be designated as a violent crime detective.

Commissioner Thompson asked about the ultimate source of funding for this grant. Ms. Buchanan stated that it is federal pass-through.

Commissioner Aldred moved now on this day, the County Commission of the County of Boone does hereby approve an application to apply for the state grant – Missouri Department of Public Safety 2027 State Services to Victims Fund (SSVF) for the period of July 1, 2026, to June 30, 2027.

Commissioner Thompson seconded the motion.

Purchasing

9. First Reading: Cooperative Contract Award: C001115 (Sourcewell Cooperative Contract 040924) – Equipment, Products, and Services with United Rentals (North America), Inc.

Purchasing Director Melinda Bobbitt stated that Boone County Office of Emergency Management requests permission to utilize the Sourcewell Cooperative Contract 040924 – Equipment, Products, and Services with United Rentals (North America), Inc. The County Contract number is C001115. The contract will be used primarily for equipment rental by Emergency Management during disasters. This is a Countywide term-and-supply contract.

Commissioner Kendrick requested that the Clerk add the matter to a future meeting agenda for a second reading.

10. First Reading: Award of Contract C001112 from Cooperative Contract R240107 Furniture, Installation, and Related Services through Inside the Lines for Jasper Seating Company, Inc.

Commissioner Kendrick requested that the Clerk add the matter to a future meeting agenda for a second reading.

11. First Reading: Award of Contract C001099 (10-05MAR26) - Gravel Rd Paving #1: Ridge Road, Sugar Creek, and Smith Hatchery for Boone County Resource Management Department.

Ms. Bobbitt stated that request for Bid #10-05MAR26 – Gravel Road Paving #1: Ridge Road, Sugar Creek, and Smith Hatchery opened March 5, 2026. Two bid responses were received from Capital Paving & Construction, LLC and Christensen Construction Co. The Resource Management Department recommends awarding the base bid and bid alternate #1 to Capital

Paving & Construction, LLC for a total of \$2,850,336.96. A 10% contingency amount has been added to the Purchase Order for a total amount of \$3,135,370.66. The County Contract number is C001099. Funds will come from Department 4140 – Rural Gravel Road Stabilization and Account 71202 – Contractor Costs. \$10,390,000 is budgeted for 2026.

Commissioner Kendrick expressed his appreciation for the Resource Management team and all their hard work to get the project to this point.

Commissioner Kendrick requested that the Clerk add the matter to a future meeting agenda for a second reading.

12. First Reading: Award of Contract C001116 from Cooperative Contract R230301 for Educational School Supplies, Instructional Solutions and Related Products with Lakeshore Learning Materials, LLC

Ms. Bobbitt stated that the Purchasing Department requests approval of NCPA, an Omnia Partners Company Contract R230301 for Educational School Supplies, Instructional Solutions, and Related Products with Lakeshore Learning Materials, LLC. This contract will be used by the Boone County Public Safety Childcare Center. The Boone County Contract number is C001116. The contract expiration date is December 31, 2026, and has two one-year renewals. This is a term-and-supply contract.

Commissioner Kendrick requested that the Clerk add the matter to a future meeting agenda for a second reading.

13. First Reading: Amendment #4 to Contract C000688 (32-29SEP23) - Small Interior and Exterior Construction Projects with Professional Contractors & Engineers, Inc. (PCE) for the Clerk's Office Remodel

Ms. Bobbitt stated that Amendment #4 to Contract C000688, awarded from RFB 32-29SEP23, the Boone County Qualified Vendors List (QVL) for Small Interior and Exterior Construction Projects, awards the Clerk's Office Renovation project to Professional Contractors & Engineers (PCE). Contract C000688 is one of six contracts awarded as Countywide term-and-supply contracts. The Clerk's Office Renovation is overseen by the Boone County Facilities Management Department. Plans were prepared by PWArchitects. PCE will perform the renovation work. Contract C000688 with PCE was originally awarded November 2, 2023, by Purchasing Director Melinda Bobbitt. Payment for the project will reference these codes: Department 4120 – Government Center Capital Projects / Account 91900 – Construction in Progress: \$137,694.

Commissioner Kendrick requested that the Clerk add the matter to a future meeting agenda for a second reading.

14. First Reading: Award of Contract C001106 (PCA OD-414-24 ATC-TS) - Chariot 2 iScrub Floor Scrubber for Boone County Regional Training Center

Ms. Bobbitt stated that the Boone County Facilities Management Department requests permission to utilize the PCA cooperative contract PCA OD-414-24 ATC-TS with Q4 Industries, LLC as an approved seller for All Things Contracted LLC – ATC to purchase one Chariot 2 iScrub 22 SP + 114 AGM + OBC + Brush floor scrubber. This purchase will be for the Boone County Sheriff's Regional Training Center. The County Contract number is C001106. The total cost of this purchase is \$17,148.80 and will be paid by department 4130 – LE Training Center Construction and account 71231 – Owner Costs. The 2026 total budget amount is \$19,000.

Commissioner Thompson asked if this was for a push scrubber. Ms. Bobbitt stated that she was not sure, but she would inquire about it and report back to the Commissioners.

Resource Management

21. First Reading: Utility Agreement between Boone County and Boone Electric Cooperative for the King Road Bridge Replacement project.

Resource Management Chief Engineer Jeff McCann stated that this agreement is necessary for the construction of King Road Bridge because there is an overhead line that is close enough to the bridge that it will be an obstacle for the crane and other large construction equipment. Mr. McCann stated that the agreement will cover the cost for Boone Electric to install guide wires to existing poles on either side of the creek and take out the section of the wire that crosses the creek, then return once the contractor has finished and reinstall the section of the wire. Mr. McCann stated that the total cost for the agreement will be \$7,574.

Commissioner Kendrick asked what the timing of the project would be. Mr. McCann stated that the contractor hopes to begin by the first of August, and the bridge will be closed for around nine weeks.

Commissioner Kendrick requested that the Clerk add the matter to a future meeting agenda for a second reading.

22. First and Second Reading: Request by D & D Investments of Columbia LLC to approve a Final Development Plan for Willow Creek East on 78.76 acres located at 8455 E. St. Charles Rd.

Resource Management Director Bill Florea stated that the property is located on 78.76 acres with pending zoning of Planned Single Family Residential and Planned General Commercial, and approval of the final development plan would make the zoning permanent. Mr. Florea stated that the Planning & Zoning Commission approved the item at its August 21, 2025, meeting and found that the plan meets the requirements of approval of a final plan, including compliance with all conditions placed on the review plan. Mr. Florea stated that a development agreement with D&D Investments should be presented for the Commissioners' review soon. Mr. Florea stated that that agreement will credit the company for construction of Mosby Road against the traffic generation fee that would otherwise be assessed.

Commissioner Kendrick asked when the project would begin. Mr. Florea stated that the company is starting some construction, such as grading and sewer work, now. Mr. Florea stated that he expects a final plat by the end of the year.

Commissioner Thompson moved now on this day, the County Commission of the County of Boone does hereby approve a Final Development Plan for Willow Creek East in the Planned Single Family Residential and Planned General Commercial zoning district on 78.76 acres located at 8455 E. St. Charles Road.
